Key Terms

Critical Thinking Questions

(Sample answers - student responses may vary but should reference content from the article)

1. How might the increasing use of technology in healthcare change the role of Registered Nurses in the next decade? What skills would be most important for future nurses to develop?

Sample answer: Technology will likely automate routine tasks and expand telehealth capabilities, requiring nurses to become more skilled with electronic health records, digital monitoring tools, and virtual patient interactions. Future nurses will need strong technological literacy alongside traditional clinical skills. Critical skills would include adaptability to new systems, digital communication abilities, data analysis, and the ability to balance technology use with maintaining human connection. As mentioned in the article, “Modern nursing combines traditional caregiving with technological expertise,” so nurses will need to develop both technical and interpersonal competencies.

2. Consider the physical and emotional demands of nursing described in the article. What self-care strategies might be important for nurses to develop to maintain their wellbeing throughout their career?

Sample answer: Based on the article’s description of 12-hour shifts, constant standing/walking, and exposure to high-stress situations, nurses need comprehensive self-care strategies. These might include proper ergonomics and body mechanics to prevent injuries, regular exercise to maintain physical strength, adequate sleep planning around shift work, stress management techniques like mindfulness or meditation, professional boundaries to avoid emotional burnout, supportive peer relationships, regular mental health check-ins, and work-life balance strategies. Since the article mentions nurses walk 4-5 miles per shift, appropriate footwear and physical conditioning would also be important.

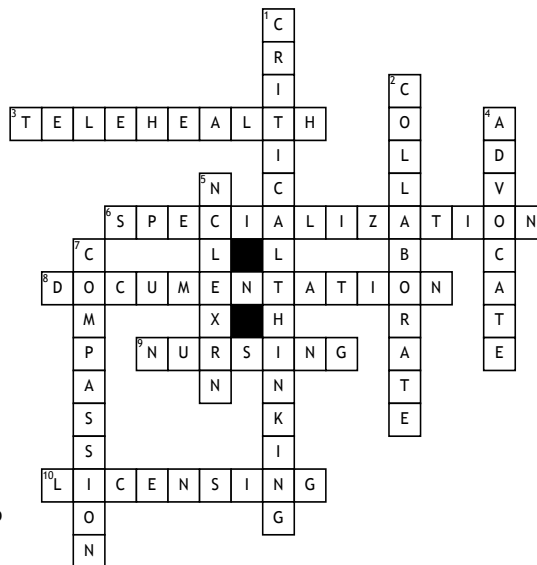
