Main Concept Overview - Answer Key:

Advanced layering techniques require you to make strategic decisions about where to create **symmetry** and where to break it for better face framing. When working around face shapes, you might create **multiple** guides for front sections to ensure proper face framing. Smart **tool** selection prevents damage and creates the results your clients want. Only use razors on healthy, medium to coarse hair with low **porosity**. Strategic weight **placement** solves common client complaints like hair that flips out on one side.

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Application Questions - Sample Answers:

- 1. Weight Distribution Solution:** Add weight to the problem side by using lower elevation angles or maintaining more length in that area. The added weight will counteract the cowlick's lifting effect and help the hair lie properly.
- 2. Tool Selection for Damaged Hair:** Use point cutting only. The rough texture indicates damage/high porosity, making razors and texturizing shears unsafe. Point cutting affects only the ends and won't cause additional damage to the hair shaft.

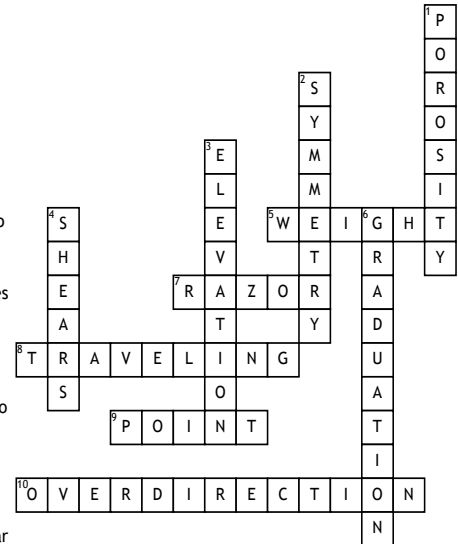
