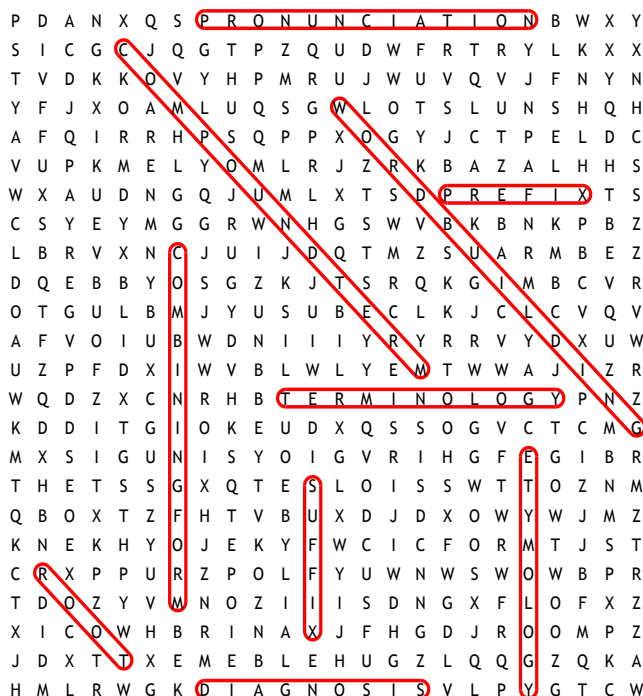

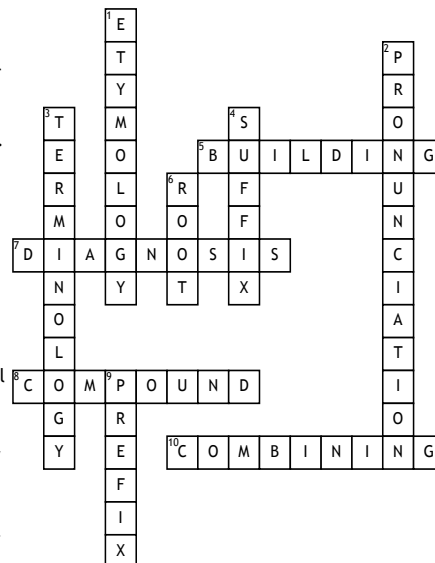

Introduction

Word Parts
