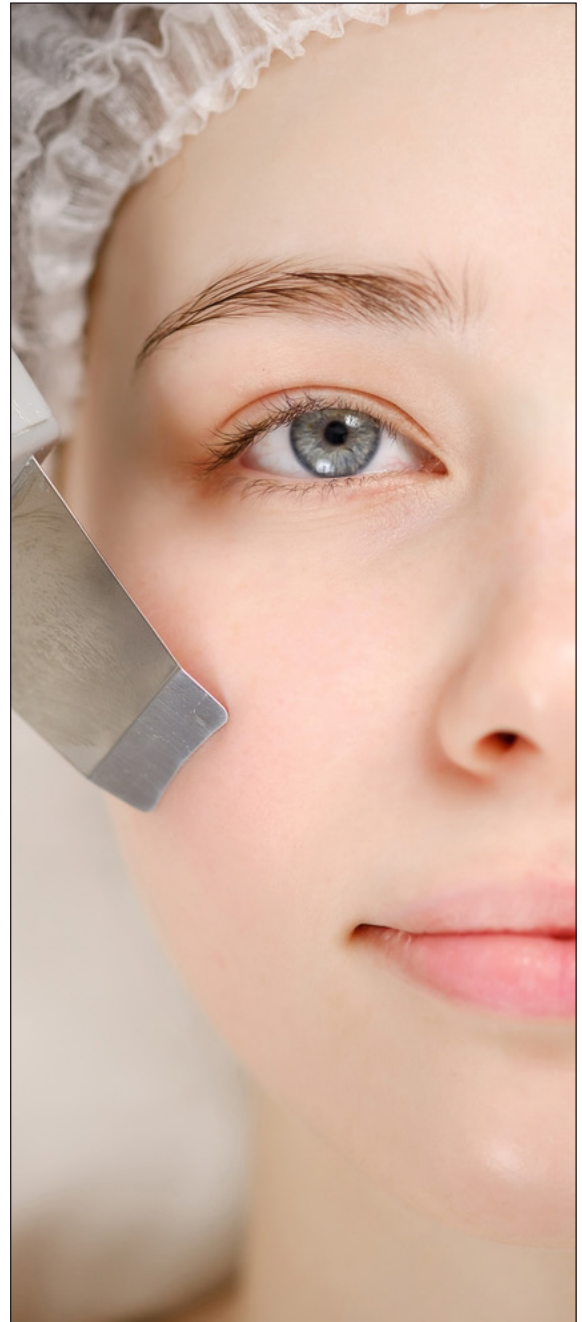

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survive outside the human body for days or weeks, making proper cleaning critical for your safety. You'll be tested on these safety steps in your state licensing exam.

You may encounter blood during services like eyebrow threading, cuticle cutting, or accidental nicks during shaving. Hepatitis B attacks the liver and can cause lifelong health problems. This virus is much more infectious than HIV and can survive on surfaces for up to seven days. Hepatitis C also damages the liver and currently has no vaccine for prevention.

You must treat every client as potentially infectious, regardless of their appearance or health claims. This universal precaution approach means following the same strict procedures for every single client, every single time.

Hospital-Grade Cleaning Techniques and Products

Think of your disinfectants as your safety superheroes—they fight invisible enemies that regular soap can't touch. Professional disinfectants like Barbicide or Cavicide contain strong ingredients designed to kill viruses and bacteria quickly. You must choose EPA-registered products that specifically list effectiveness against the pathogens you want to eliminate.

The three-step cleaning process starts with washing tools to remove visible debris. Next, completely immerse tools in disinfectant solution for the required contact time. Cross-contamination occurs when pathogens transfer from one person, surface, or tool to another. You must establish clear workflows that prevent contaminated items from mixing with clean supplies. This requires separate storage areas, designated work surfaces, and strict hand hygiene practices.

Hepatitis B can survive on surfaces for up to seven days, making it far more infectious than many people realize.

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The one-tool-one-client rule means that every implement touching a client's skin must be completely cleaned before use on another person. Single-use items like cotton balls, tissues, and disposable gloves must be thrown away immediately after contact with each client.

Color-coding systems help you track the status of tools and supplies throughout your workday. Many salons use red containers for contaminated items, yellow for items being cleaned, and green for ready-to-use tools.

Hand washing represents your first line of defense against spreading infections. You must wash hands thoroughly with antimicrobial soap for at least 20 seconds before and after each client contact. Hand sanitizers can supplement but never replace proper hand washing with soap and water.
