Lesson Objective: You will demonstrate and maintain proper professional appearance standards in healthcare settings through application of dress code requirements, personal hygiene practices, and identification protocols. Top 5 Important Concepts: Professional Appearance in Healthcare

1. Dress Code Compliance: You must follow facility-specific uniform requirements including proper fit, approved colors, and appropriate footwear to ensure safety and present a unified professional image.

2. Personal Hygiene: You need to maintain daily bathing, oral care, and use of unscented deodorant while avoiding strong perfumes or colognes that could trigger patient allergies or respiratory issues.

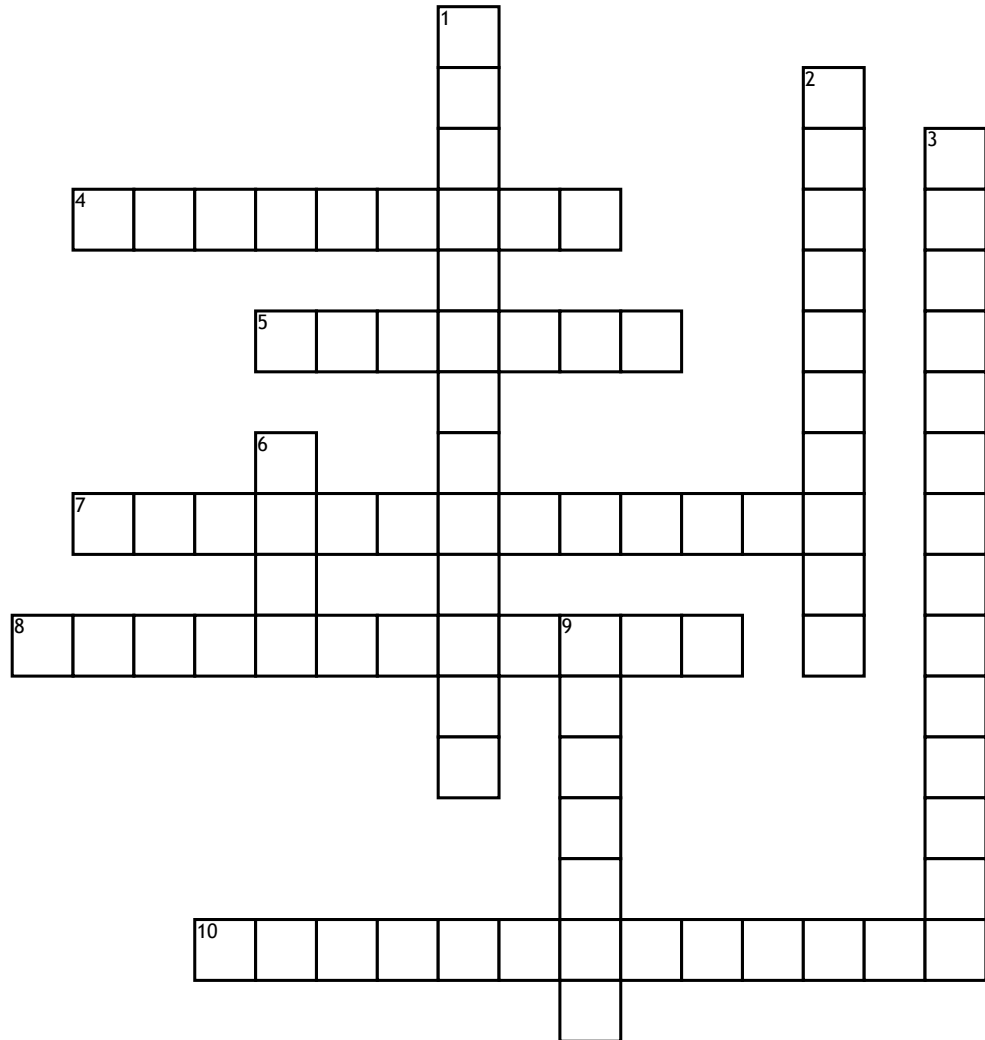
